Welcome from the Vice Chancellor

Dear new faculty member:

On behalf of Dhofar University (DU), I would like to extend to you a very warm welcome. I am sure that you have questions regarding terms of contract, University calendar, life in Salalah, children's schooling, and other issues. In the lines below I shall provide answers to those questions. You should also read the document "Conditions of Employment" and the catalogue which can be downloaded from <http://www.du.edu.om/>.

1. If you haven't been to Oman or the Arab Gulf countries, you are advised to read credible material about the culture and society. One useful and readily accessible source is the website of the Ministry of Information (www.omanet.om) which includes links to other sites and sources. We have also created a special web page (New Faculty Orientation) for new faculty which can be viewed from our home page. Salalah is the capital of Dhofar province (thus the name of the university which refers to the province) some 1000 kms south of the capital Muscat. It is a summer resort for Omanis and other residents of the Gulf because it has a milder weather- temperature below 30 degrees Celsius in the summer with light drizzle. The nature is beautiful with plenty of fruit trees. The cost of living there is lower than Muscat or other Gulf capitals. Oman is also among the less conservative countries in the Gulf with tolerance for diversity of religions and cultures.
2. Dhofar University (DU) has been run by the American University of Beirut (AUB) since September 1, 2004; its curriculum and policies were prepared by an AUB team who continues to provide technical support and consultation to ensure the delivery of quality education. AUB has seconded me as President/Vice Chancellor of DU since January 1, 2007. The deans of the colleges are also AUB secondees.
3. All new recruits for the first semester 2008-2009 should arrive in Salalah between September 1 and September 5, 2008. DO NOT book flights that reach Salalah in August because we will have hard time finding you a room at the local hotels. August is high season here where tourists flood the city and occupy all vacant rooms and apartments. The first few days of September are for registration, orientation of new students and faculty, and preparation for the fall semester. New recruits for the second semester 2007-2008 should arrive around mid February once their visas are ready. The University calendar can be viewed on the website www.du.edu.om.
4. Upon arrival in Salalah, you will stay at a hotel for up to 3 days with full accommodation paid by DU. During these days, DU staff will assist you in finding an appropriate accommodation for you (and your family, if applicable). DU does not rent accommodations for its faculty and

staff so you have to pay for the rent from your annual supplement, but you shall receive an advance payment to help you pay your rental charge and cover other necessary relocation expenses. We recommend that you rent a furnished unit but you may choose to get an unfurnished unit then buy the furniture yourself. Furnished units are air-conditioned and include all the basic household items- fridge, TV, gas range, beds, kitchen utensils, All the other household needs that you may wish to buy are available in the local market at inexpensive prices. So you are advised not to ship standard household items. However, we shall provide up to OR 100 for shipping expenses for each new recruit (200 per couple) to be paid against receipts after arrival. Cars are also cheaper in Oman than in your country and taxi service is also available and inexpensive.

5. Annual supplement/allowances include expenses specified in the contract. The end-of-service indemnity is an additional benefit. Annual salary and annual supplement will be pro-rated and paid monthly. The end-of-service indemnity is one month for every year of active service that shall be paid at the end of your service.
6. The basic salary, allowances, health insurance and end-of service indemnity cover all payments and benefits, and are tax-free. Employees have to pay for their tickets (as well as their family members, if any), housing, children's school fees, etc. DU can help by providing useful information, initiating contact with certain parties, giving recommendations and suggestions, etc.
7. Once we get approval for your employment from the relevant authorities and provide visa papers, please proceed with booking your flights immediately then buying your tickets. Once you book your flight, give us your itinerary and flight details by faxing them to 00968-23225064.
8. Please note that all your degrees (BA, MA., Ph.D.) should be notarized by an Omani embassy (go to the one located nearest to you or call them to send your documents by registered mail). This is part of the regulations for approval by the Omani Ministry of Higher Education in order to obtain the residence permit. Once you have done that, please express mail the following items to Mr. Said AlMashani, Manager of Human Resources, Dhofar University, P.O.Box 2509, Postal Code: 211, Salalah, Sultanate of Oman (you can also contact Ms. Qatan by email: said_almashani@du.edu.om or telephone: +968-23225061 ext. 350):
 - a. A copy of the degrees that were notarized.
 - b. Attestation letters from current and previous employers showing your work experience.
 - c. An updated CV
 - d. Three passport-size photographs
 - e. A copy of the first few pages of your passport showing the passport expiry date.
 - f. If you are a resident of India or Pakistan, you need a medical certificate notarized by the Omani Embassy indicating that you are in good health. For other nationalities, a certificate of good health from your family doctor is required, but you do not need to notarize it at the Omani embassy.
 - g. The Ministry of Higher Education (MoHE) application form (which you need to fill in and sign).
9. Appropriate recommended international schools for your children (if applicable) are: The British School (Tel/Fax 00968235242; e-mail brschlib@omantel.net.om; website: www.britishschoolsalalah.com) for those whose children have minimum proficiency in English

and the Indian school for Indians. The fees at the British school are higher (OR 1,500 per year) and the classes are limited to the primary grades- ages 4-11. For details, you should check with the school or access its web site. The Indian school is a complete k-12 school. Its annual fees range from around OR 300 for the preschool to around OR 400 for the upper grades. Admission and placement should be easy.

10. Teaching load: In the regular academic programs, it is 12 credit hours per semester for the Ph.D. holders regardless of rank and 15 credit hours per semester for M.A. holders. The teaching load at the Foundation Program is 18 contact hours.
11. Times of teaching would vary depending on the timing of the courses you are offering. Some courses are offered in the morning beginning at 8:00 a.m., others in the afternoon until 6:00 or 7:00 p.m. The schedule will not be finalized before August. However, course scheduling is set by the program coordinator such that it is flexible enough to accommodate various requests by the faculty whenever possible.
12. The plans for development are really the plans for building a first-rate university campus that includes all the facilities, equipment, and learning resources found in reputable universities in the world. Construction of the new campus is going according to the set schedule.
13. The DU catalogue describes the various programs and courses, present and emerging, and the research report describes the research activities and cites the publications by the faculty members.
14. DU has launched a self-assessment study in preparation for institutional auditing by the Oman Accreditation Council. This is a required step before applying for accreditation in Oman, and shall later seek accreditation from accrediting agencies in the USA.

New Faculty Orientation

This website gives easy access to essential information to new faculty who are joining Dhofar University. It links you to places and people at Dhofar University who can help before you arrive on campus, and in the initial stages of your employment.



Before the beginning of the academic year, the Office of Information and Public Relation plans for an orientation to all new faculty. The orientation involves preparations for arrival, getting settled, and organizing a schedule of social activities whereby New Faculty has an opportunity to meet with administrators, faculty members, and mentors. The New Faculty Handbook to be developed by the Center for Teaching and Learning orients faculty into academic matters.

Early Preparations: (during the months of July and August)

A Welcome note from the Vice Chancellor: is distributed to the new faculty and posted on the New Faculty Website.

An Email of Instructions from the PR Department: An email is sent from the staff of PR welcoming the new faculty to DU and giving them a few instructions on the basic procedures of arrival.

Contact with the Ministry of Tourism: is contacted to provide maps and information for the new faculty where they send bags with the items and pins for the new office to distribute to the new faculty.

Sponsorship: Some companies sponsor the new faculty orientation such as Bank Muscat, Hamdan Plaza and Bank Dhofar. Bank Dhofar

Hotel Bookings: The Hamdan Plaza Hotel accommodates the entire new faculty on their first 3 days after their arrival. Furthermore, the hotel provides transportation for the new faculty from the airport.

Coordination with HR Department: The HR manager sends a report on the arrivals of the new faculty during the month of August

New Faculty Orientation Website: is updated so that the new faculty could find out all the relevant information related to their stay, education, food, entertainment, transportation...etc.

Contacting Owners of Flats and Villas: The OIPR staff contacts flat and villa owners to create a list of possible places for the new faculty to choose from once they arrive. A wide range of places are made available to suit all preferences according to location, price and space.

Post Arrival of New Faculty:

1) Preparing a list: A list is prepared by the PR staff with all the names of the new faculty through HR Department. This list is intended to put in order the dates of their arrival in addition to collecting their contact information in case the office needed to contact them and listing in which area they were staying.

2) Receiving New Faculty: The OIPR staff receives new faculty members usually in late August. A PR staff member drives to the airport and makes sure that the transportation from the hotel has arrived and that the new faculty member is aware that he/she will be staying at the hotel for 3 days until he/she finds accommodation. After that, a plan is made with the new faculty member to start the search for a suitable apartment and other facilitations. Another procedure of receiving new faculty is handing them two gift bags; one with the important DU publications in it and the DU T-shirt and cap, and the other one with a map, a small souvenir and publications from the Ministry of Tourism.

3) Taking Photos: The officer photographer takes personal photos of all the new faculty as they arrive. This is to keep in the office archives for future use and to also post their photos on the NFO website to introduce them to the rest of the university staff and students.

4) Welcome Announcement on DU Website: There is also a small Welcome note in the form of a pop-up on the DU website that displays the names and photos of the new faculty.

5) Choosing Accommodation: PR staff takes the new faculty members everyday to look at flats and villas and encourages them to select the suitable accommodation before they complete the three days since their arrival.

6) Cell phones: PR staff take the opportunity to open mobile numbers for the new faculty.

7) New Faculty Tour: PR staff organizes a tour to introduce the new faculty to the main tourist attractions in Salalah. This is to help them get acquainted with each other and the PR staff and to also know where the best places are to enjoy their free time during their stay in Dhofar. For example, the new faculty is taken to the Land of Frankincense Museum and to the major tourist attractions in the direction of Taqa and to dinner in Ba'labak restaurant.

8) Iftar Gathering/dinner: Every year the PR office organizes an Iftar Gathering or a dinner in the honour of the Vice Chancellor to welcome the new faculty and to give them and the rest of the faculty and staff the chance to get acquainted.

Getting Settled

Getting Settled includes a variety of hints and tips to explain the process of getting your paper work done and moving into your apartment along with all the basics that need to be done upon arrival.

If you contact DU ahead of time about your arrival, you will be met at the airport and brought to the campus or to your hotel. The first time you come to the campus, you should report to the Human Resources Section (Al Mawada Building No. 1, Room H 101), where you will be welcomed in and will be informed of what is required of you during the first few days. The first step will be to find accommodation. The staff from the office of Information and Public Relations will take you and show you a selection of places to live, according to your preferences.

You can rent a car right away at *Thrifty Cars Rental*. This car rental agency gave Dhofar University a special rate of 150 OR a month to rent a car. For more details about this agency or any others, please contact:

A few days after you arrive, you will be taken to a medical center for a required blood test. You will then give DU your passport and Human Resources Section will arrange for your residence card and work visa. This may take one or two weeks.

After you have your residence card, you can open a bank account and arrange to pay for a car if you choose to buy one instead of rent one.

Housing:

The Housing Unit in the IPR section of the DU will assist you in finding housing. You can also contact *Mr. Abdulrahman Aqeel Baomar* at abdulrahman_baomar@du.edu.om for specific information.

Transportation:

There is no public transportation in Salalah. This is why most newcomers either rent or buy a car. (Cars can be easily sold when you leave)

Taxis:

Taxis must be flagged down on the street. You can usually find a taxi within minutes on any main road. Charges are set according to the distance of the ride, and are pretty standard. There are no meters, however, so you should agree on the cost with the taxi driver before you start out. Most speak enough English to be able to communicate the rate (which should be somewhere between half a rial and 3 rials.)

Shopping:

There are several large grocery stores such as the Lulu Hypermarket (near the airport), Al Isteqrar Supermarket and Al Mashoor Supermarket (both with branches close to DU) and other smaller stores. There is one supermarket ('Spinney's', near the air force base), which caters especially to European and North American tastes.

Hotels and Entertainment:

There are two large hotels with health clubs and swimming pools where you can get a family membership for a reasonable price:

Crowne Plaza Hotel, which is a ten minute drive from the University, and is very popular with faculty and staff members, and the Hilton Resort, which is a fifteen minute drive up the coast.

Hospitals and Clinics:

DU provides health insurance arranged for you. You will be advised to attend a local private hospital here in Salalah. Please ask *Mr. Said Al Maashani* from Human Resources Section about this when you arrive.

Telephones and Internet:

One can buy a cell phone and a number very easily from either of the two major telephone companies. Getting a telephone and internet hookup in a rented house or flat may take some time, however. If an internet connection is required at your home, you should check with the telephone company on the availability of internet lines in your neighborhood before you sign a rental agreement. There are usually lines available, but it is worth making sure first.

Newspapers and Books:

The "Family Bookstore," a well known Middle Eastern chain sells books in English as well as Arabic, postcards, newspapers (ex. Sunday Times, The Telegraph, International Herald Tribune and many other international newspapers) and a large selection of magazines including Time, Newsweek, New Scientist, Good Housekeeping, etc. They will also order books from outside the country. One can order books and music easily from amazon.co.uk or amazon.com and they usually arrive within a week or two, depending on the availability of the items you have ordered.

Attractions for Visitors

Mughsayl Beach

This spectacular beach is 40 kilometers west of Salalah. It is known for its blow holes, especially during the monsoon, as well as the stunning sea views and jagged cliffs and mountains. The Mughsayl Beach Tourist Restaurant, located by the beach, offers visitors an international menu and water sports.

Prophet's Emran's Tomb

Located near the Clock Tower in Salalah, the tomb of Prophet Emran is an extraordinary site to visit, as the tomb itself is around 30 meters long. Prophet Emran was the father of Virgin Mary.

Frankincense Trail

Al Balid is an excavation site near downtown Salalah which is part of the Frankincense Trail. It is protected by UNESCO and marked as one of the World Heritage Sites. Khor Rowri, 37 kilometers from Salalah is known as the site of an ancient port connected with the trade in frankincense, and is famous also as a 'portal to the netherworlds' for those who believe in witchcraft.

The Magic Road

This road is a dirt track that lies on to your left when you hit the road from Taqa to Mirbat. The road leads to a short drive down a hill on an elevated dirt-trail. When you reach the base of the trail, switch off your engine and put the gear into "neutral". Keep your foot on the brake lightly to "regulate". Your vehicle instead of rolling down, it begins to roll back UP the hill.

The Mountains

The mountains of Jebel Dhofar, which rise to 1,000m, encircle the Salalah plain and stretch westwards into Yemen. Sailors have made landfall on this coast for thousands of years en route from Africa, the Red Sea, India and beyond. There are many roads leading up into the mountains, and one can never tire of exploring the peaks and valleys, caves and villages, while encountering endless numbers of cows, goats and camels grazing on either side of the road.

Samhuran

The ruins of a port, Samhuran, known to have been in its heyday over 2,000 years ago lie on a promontory between two khawrs, or sea creeks, some 30 km east of Salalah. Locally and popularly known as the Queen of Sheba's Palace, Samhuran was important for the trade in frankincense. The well-fortified ancient city of Samhuran is thought to date back to 3,000 BC. It was the principal port from which frankincense was shipped in ancient times, the first leg of its journey being a 650-Km voyage to Qana in present-day Yemen. The ruins, built to withstand attack by sea or land, still bear witness to the preciousness of frankincense and its economic importance. Exported frankincense from Samhuran found its way to ancient Egypt, Greece and Rome. A drawing of a Pharaonic ship docked at Samhuran is still displayed in one of the temples in the Valley of the Kings in Luxor. The Queen of Sheba also dispatched a boatload of frankincense from this port as a gift to the Prophet Solomon.

Port of Salalah

Located south of Salalah, just 150 km from major East-West shipping lanes, Salalah Port has been established as a leading container transshipment center on the Indian Ocean Rim since it opened in November 1998.

Since its opening, it has witnessed steady growth in shipping traffic and has the potential to generate rapid industrial development in southern Oman.

The government's plans to establish a free-trade zone at Salalah adjacent to the port have the potential to make Salalah a major air-sea cargo hub. This free trade zone is expected to attract storage and warehousing facilities as well as value-added light industries.

[Water Springs](#)

As a result of the non-stop rain during the monsoon, or the 'Khareef' season, many springs gush forth. There are numerous springs in the Salalah area, such as Jarziz, Sahanoot, Razat, Athoom, and Humran. Most of them have pleasant gardens and shady trees around them, which make them an ideal place for a picnic.

[Al Balid](#)

The civilisation of Manjawi dwelt in the district of Balid between the 12th and 16th centuries. At this time, the area was renowned for its thriving import and export activities, the main exports being Arabian horses and Frankincense. Al-Mughsayl possesses 3 archaeological sites with traces of ancient walls, tombs and mosques.

It is thought that Ahmed bin Mohammed al Haboudhi rebuilt the city and renamed it Al-Mansourah (The Victorious) and this status was reaffirmed in the writings of explorers Marco Polo and Ibn Batuta.

There is a new museum which opened in mid 2007 as well as a souvenir shop. It is worth a visit for anyone who is interested in the history of the region.

[Hafa Souq](#)

The old souq, or market place down near the Sultan's Husn Palace on the ocean is always a 'must' for people visiting Salalah. Many small shops line the narrow streets, and it is pleasant to stroll through the area particularly in the evening, smelling the frankincense wafting through the air and browsing through the shops, which sell everything from local crafts to perfume, incense, turbans, embroidered caps, brightly colored cloth and dishdashas, (the long robes worn by Omani men) as well as gold, silver, daggers and old guns.

[The Corniche](#)

The 'Corniche' is the long road right on the beach at Salalah, running from Hafa Souq and Al Husn Palace to several kilometers east, just meters from the ocean, along a golden sandy beach. The Corniche, like Al Hafa is particularly worth visiting in the late afternoon, at sunset, or during the evening. There are many local restaurants that have set up tables right on the sidewalk, and one can order sweet tea or fresh fruit juice, and sit and watch the local populace stroll by. If one wants to encounter the true personality of Salalah, the Corniche is the place to experience the laid back air of relaxation, punctuated by the roar of the crashing waves during the monsoon, or by the shouts of the children or young men playing football on the sand, as the locals sit out on their front steps, chatting, playing chess, or even mending fishing nets. This is Salalah at its best!
