He was the first Omani language teacher in Dhofar and he has a goal to earn the respect from that community achievement. Dr. Moosa arrived at Dhofar University with valuable experiences and qualifications in developing future teachers. Thanks to the university's education program, he knew that he had found his place. His passion for preparing teachers for future students enables him to frame teacher training and their qualifications.

As a professional, Dr. Moosa continued to challenge himself to further his training and used his own experiences to inform others. His leadership roles have always been about teamwork - he values the people around him, as he believes they are there to guide and support each other to be successful. He hopes to continue

Background

He also spent close to 7 years working for the Ministry of Education as a Senior English Language Supervisor. Following that, he arrived at Dhofar University to work in various levels in the Education department, including as Chair of the Education Department in CAAS, Director of the Postgraduate Department, and now Director of the FP.


Students with Disabilities Support Services Unit

Access to education is the number one thing all young people need. To better achieve this, Dhofar University has created a special unit that supports that goal.

Background

According to Oman's E-Census 2020, there were nearly 11,000 children with impairments in the country. Oman offers a variety of specialized and mainstream services for those with disabilities; in fact, the Sultanate was among the first in the area to push for children with special needs to be included in mainstream education.

As efforts have been made to care for students with disabilities at various levels of study, the education of persons with disabilities has seen a sharp increase in recent years and has attracted the attention of both the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Higher Education.



This is in line with Oman's Vision 2040, which states unequivocally that it is important to "improve the principle of just and equitable access to social care for all members of the Omani society so that they enjoy social welfare."

Impact at Dhofar University

In order to give students with special needs the right services and assistance they require, DU's Students with Disabilities Support Services Unit works hard to anticipate all the difficulties they face while on campus. In addition to providing afteradmission preparatory training that

involves exposure to campus life and briefings on programs available suited with their impairment conditions as well as integrating them into the Campus community, the Center also provides a wide scope of other services and assistance for students.

Core objectives:

- 01. To offer people with disabilities all-inclusive support services ranging from their educational requirements, physical requirements, and cognitive requirements, to their social and active needs.
- 02. To offer consistent, definable, and criteria-based social, psychological, and educational support services to people with disabilities.
- 03.

To encourage research and studies that concentrate on the requirements and difficulties faced by people with disabilities, as well as the means of empowering them and enhancing their talents.

Students with Disabilities Support Services Unit strives to provide outstanding and comprehensive support services to all persons with disabilities in a way that helps them to adapt to their various environments, and empower them in Omani society for positive changes in their life.
